## Psychological Science

During the transition to the Rebalanced Curriculum Initiative students should work closely with their advisor or the program director to plan out their course work to meet their major requirements. The table below provides some guidance for students and advisors.

<b>Class of...</b>	<b>Old or New major requirements</b>	<b>Courses to be offered <u>only</u> during transition</b>	<b>Changes or considerations</b>
2020	New	PSYC 243 will be allowed to count as an equivalent to PSYC 241. NEUR 201 will be allowed to count as an equivalent to NEUR 105. BIO 105/106 will be equivalent to BIO 107/108	All students can adopt the old requirements, but to graduate they will only need the new 11 course sequence.
2021	New	PSYC 243 will be allowed to count as an equivalent to PSYC 241. NEUR 201 will be allowed to count as an equivalent to NEUR 105. BIO 105/106 for BIO 107/108	Students are strongly advised to take PSYC 241. Students will only need 11 courses to graduate.
2022	New	Only PSYC 241 will be allowed to count towards the major. Neuro 105 will be required to complete the major.	

The changes will be relatively minor, and consist of relaxing some of the requirements to make the path through the major more flexible. These new requirements will go into effect on July 1, 2019. If your graduation date is before that, these changes will not apply to you, and you must meet the existing requirements.

Current majors with a graduation date after July 1, 2019 may choose to follow either the current requirements or the new requirements. Because the current requirements are a less-flexible version of the new requirements, we will assume that you'll choose the new requirements, unless you inform us otherwise.

These changes will allow majors to complete the requirements more flexibly, by adding an "elective" credit (which can be either graded or ungraded) that can be fulfilled using traditional courses or ungraded PSYC credits like Independent Research or Field Work. We anticipate that this will allow students more freedom to choose their path through the major.

We offer a range of intensive courses, but do not have a major requirement for intensives.
